Rangers Repeat in D2

epeating as MHSAA Division 2 boys lacrosse champion has been no easy task. Grand Rapids Forest Hills Central had missed doing so on four previous attempts. But in 2023, the Rangers became just the second program in MHSAA history to repeat in Division 2, defeating Detroit Country Day for the second consecutive year in the Final, 11-6.



"It's really special (to repeat). We've had a couple opportunities to do that before and unfortunately haven't been able to piece that together," Forest Hills Central coach Andy Shira said.

East Grand Rapids is the only other program to win consecutive D2 championships, when it won three straight from 2007-09.

But it was Detroit Country Day (19-3) whifch got off to a fast start. The Yellowjackets opened by scoring the first three goals when Mason Gal, Bonner Upshaw and Will Thompson each found the net over the first nine minutes of play.

Shira called a timeout to regroup the Rangers (18-4), and the game was never the same.

"We just needed the kids to settle down and execute better," Shira said. "We had a little too much going on; we were a little frantic. So, once we settled down and the kids got to work, everything started to work in our favor."

Forest Hills Central would lock in defensively, holding DCD to just one goal over the final 15 minutes of the first half.

While the defense was in control, the FHC offense rallied

behind Magnus Salmon, who scored four times in the second period to lift the Rangers to a 6-4 halftime lead.

In the second half, it was Jonah McConnell who had the hot stick. He found the net three times during the half and four times in the game to keep DCD from getting within reach.

Forest Hills Central goalie Crandall Quinn put on a dominant final three quarters of play, holding the Yellowjackets to three goals while making nine saves in net.

Division 1 - Brother Rice 14, Detroit CC 11

Riding the championship experience the program has built for decades, Bloomfield Hills Brother Rice got back to the top of MHSAA Division 1 lacrosse in 2023.

Leading by just a goal with 4:47 to play, the Warriors would capitalize on their offensive opportunities and score three consecutive goals to put the Division 1 Final with Detroit Catholic Central out of reach, eventually prevailing 14-11.

In 2022, Brother Rice (20-2) lost the MHSAA Final for just the second time in history, falling in overtime to Hartland, 11-10.

One of the seniors who made a big impact in the win was Hunter Polonkey. The midfielder was dealing with a torn meniscus in his right knee, but racked up three goals and three assists.

Polonkey scored the opening goal in the second minute to give Brother Rice the initial lead, but Catholic Central (19-3) would

answer with three consecutive goals to establish a 3-1 edge.

Rice led 6-5 at the half, but CC's Sean Donahue opened the second half with a pair of goals to put the Shamrocks up 7-6 in the third, which was their last lead.

Polonkey ended the Catholic Central run with his third goal midway through the third period. Sam Klein and Caiden Ramos followed with goals to put the Warriors back up, 9-7.

With the lead 12-10, Rice goalie Cam Sims made a key save that opened the door for goals from Christian McNulty and Sam Klein to lock up the title.



Bulldogs Back to Back

The Brighton girls lacrosse team found the ideal way to avoid the revenge trap: Just do your homework and play defense.

That's the combination the Bulldogs utilized to successfully defend its Division 1 title in last June with an 8-6 win over topranked Forest Hills Northern/Eastern at Rockford High School.



The championship came after Brighton outlasted the BirdDogs 12-11 in overtime in the 2022 Final.

Instead of allowing Forest Hills Northern/Eastern to avenge that loss, Brighton smothered an offense that was averaging more than 14 goals over five tournament games.

The defense was most evident during the second half. Down 5-4 at the break, Brighton (17-8-1) was still behind 6-5 on a FHN/E goal by Mia Dye with 17:23 left. But Brighton's Ella Toth tied the game with 14:51 left, and the Bulldogs sealed it on goals by Kaia Malachino and Georgia Gill over the final 9:16.

Neither team managed more than a one-goal lead until Gill's with 3:36 left.

Gill, Toth and Lauren Zaccagni all scored twice for Brighton, which lost seven key seniors from 2022. A young Brighton team managed just a 2-4 record through the first six games. Included over the last three weeks was a 12-10 loss to Division 2 runner-up East Grand Rapids and a 6-6 tie with FHN/E.

Brighton coach Ashton Peters agreed that the win was all about defense. The six goals was only one from FHN/E's season low of five against Forest Hills Central.

"Our defense was unbelievable. We said all year that our defense was the best it's ever been. We've been focusing on communication and being in possession," Peters said.

Brighton junior goalie Gabrielle Buckenberger faced just 11 shots and made six saves.

Division 2 Detroit Country Day 13, East Grand Rapids 12

The last thing the Detroit Country Day girls lacrosse team needed was to be reminded of recent history.

Which goes a long way in understanding its stunning 13-12 win over rival East Grand Rapids in the 2023 Division 2 Final.

The Yellowjackets' Hadley Keating scored with nine seconds left as DCD denied the Pioneers a fourth-consecutive title and ninth overall. The game featured eight ties and five lead changes.

The championship game was another gem over two seasons after EGR knocked off Country Day 12-11 in overtime in 2022. Country Day thumped the Pioneers 18-5 late in the regular season. But neither prior game was on the minds of Yellowjackets players, said junior Emma Arico, who scored five goals.

"We knew we couldn't take them lightly," said Arico, who scored the tying goal with 1:04 left. "It's a whole new atmosphere. We just wanted to focus on us and trust one another."

The championship was the first for No. 1-ranked Country Day, which finished. 18-1. East Grand Rapids (16-10) had won in both 2021 and 2022, as well as 2019.

The Pioneers took a 12-11 lead with 1:43 left on a goal by MC Millman.

Neither team could gain much momentum. EGR scored the game's first three goals, Country Day six of the next seven, and the Pioneers four of the next five.

Mary Pavlou had four goals for Country Day. Millman and Vivian LaMange both had four goals, and Olivia Shaw scored three for EGR.



School Spirit is Defining Difference in HS Sports

s Education-based sports in our nation's schools are Adifferent than any other level of competition.

Youth leagues and club sports often require significant entry fees, and in many cases, the focus is on competitive success with little concern for skill development, team building or sportsmanship.

High-profile college sports have been disrupted by issues concerning media contracts, NIL and the transfer portal, with the environment a bit like the "Wild West" on campuses throughout the country.

Professional sports, of course, are about the most elite performance, entertainment and winning championships.

Sports in our nation's 19,800-plus high schools instead are much more focused on education, relationships, team unity, having fun and school spirit.

School spirit is perhaps the defining difference between interscholastic and other levels of sports - having pride in one's school, maintaining a connection to the school and coaches for life, supporting all school teams and programs whether a participant or a fan, and contributing to the bond between school and community.

On an individual basis, pride is a key component of school spirit. Students who become involved in sports take pride in their teams and school and tend to carry that pride to their future careers after high school.

High school sports have the potential to boost the spirit of communities as well. There are countless examples every year but one such community was the small town of Fertile, Minnesota, located about 270 miles northwest of Minneapolis. In 2021, Jude Olson, a junior on the Fertile-Beltrami High School nine-player football team, was killed in an accident, which shook the approximately 1,000 residents of Fertile.

Last year, however, the Fertile-Beltrami football team provided a positive boost to the town with an undefeated regular season and a first-ever trip to the Minnesota State High School League Nine-player State Football Championship at U.S. Bank Stadium in Minneapolis.

According to an article in the Grand Forks (North Dakota) Herald, many of the town's residents did not have the means to make the five-hour trek to the game. As a result, local businesses and farmers donated \$25,000 for five charter buses to make sure every fan who wanted to make the trip had a free ride to the game.

"It means a lot to the whole town," said Jodie Strem, the co-owner of Fertile Oil Company. "We want (the players) to look in the stands and see us and know we are there for them. We are coming down full force."

While the Fertile-Beltrami Falcons lost to LeRoy-Ostrander in the MSHSL Nine-player Championship, the players and the 274 fans who made the journey will remember much more than the outcome of the game.

This is school spirit at its core and why high school sports are different.

High school activity programs boost the spirit of individuals, teams and communities. Research indicated that in 2020 when these programs were shut down because of the pandemic, the mental health of students was drastically compromised.

In the post-pandemic world, there are fewer face-to-face meetings. High school activities have played a major role in bringing people back together. We know that when schools have strong school spirit, communities respond with support and increased attendance.

School spirit and sportsmanship go hand in hand. If school spirit is channeled in a positive way, and expectations for good sportsmanship are communicated

and enforced by school administrators, positive fan experiences will occur.

A survey several years ago by Varsity Brands concluded that high school students with school spirit performed better academically, were more engaged in social and civic matters, and were happier in general than their less-spirited peers.

The survey indicated that the benefits of school spirit are not just confined to the school years. The study suggested that school spirit can have lasting effects, including higher aspirations for continuing education and greater success in later life.

We are pleased to report that Varsity has commissioned a new research study, which will examine the post-pandemic educational landscape and attempt to understand how the return to in-person schooling has influenced school spirit and its profound impact on student learning, leadership and personal growth. We look forward to sharing the results of this survey down the road.

As the calendar turns to 2024, it is a great opportunity to renew commitments to these programs that involve more than 12 million participants in sports and performing arts programs that foster and celebrate school spirit.

Scholar-Athlete Class of 2024

he Michigan High School Athletic Association/Farm Bureau Insurance Scholar-Athlete Award has been recognizing the top student-athletes for 35 years. Applicants for the Scholar-Athlete Award must meet the following criteria: A minimum cumulative grade-point average of 3.5 on a 4.0 scale; and must have previously won a varsity letter. Applicants also show involvement in other school and community activities; submit two letters of recommendation and a 500-word essay on the importance of sportsmanship in educational athletics.

Recipients of the 2023-24 Scholar-Athlete Award receive a \$2,000 college scholarship to be used at the college, university, or trade school of their choice during the 2024-25 school year. This year, a total of 1,607 applications from 445 schools were received for the 32 scholarships. Class A students were guaranteed 12 winners, Class B eight winners, Class C six winners and Class D four winners. Two at-large winners were also selected.

All scholarship recipients will be honored during the MHSAA Boys Baksetball Finals at the Breslin Center in East Lansing this March.

Student Advisory Council Aids MHSAA

■ight student-athletes who will be juniors at their schools during the 2024-25 academic year have been selected to serve two-year terms on the Michigan High School Athletic Association's Student Advisory Council.

The Student Advisory Council is a 16-member group which provides feedback on issues impacting educational athletics from a student's perspective, and also is involved in the operation of MHSAA championship events and other programming. Members of the Student Advisory Council serve for two years, beginning as juniors. Eight new members are selected annually to serve on the SAC, with nominations made by MHSAA member schools. The incoming juniors will join the group of eight seniors-tobe appointed a year ago.

Those eight new members were selected from 90 applicants. The first Student Advisory Council was formed for the 2006-07 school vear. With the addition of this class beginning this summer, members will have represented 142 schools from 51 leagues plus independent schools that do not play in a league. Combined, the new appointees have participated in 10 MHSAA sports, and five will be the first SAC members from their respective schools.

The Student Advisory Council generally meets seven times each school year, and once more for a 24-hour leadership camp. In addition to assisting in the promotion of the educational value of interscholastic athletics, the Council discusses issues dealing with the 4 S's of educational athletics: scholarship, sportsmanship, safety (including health and nutrition)

The Representative Council of the Michigan High School Athletic Association is the body assembled to carry out the wishes of member schools. The Council meets several times annually to discuss and pass legislation concerning interscholastic athletics in Michigan.

The Representative Council is made up of 19 members, with all but five elected by a vote of MHSAA-member schools to represent different geographic regions, different sizes of schools, non-public schools, and junior and middle schools. Two members are elected to statewide at-large positions. Four members are appointed by the Council to facilitate representation of females and minorities, and the 19th position is occupied by the Superintendent of Public Instruction or his/her designee.

The officers and two other representatives form the MHSAA's Executive Committee, which meets on a monthly basis during the school year to review eligibility appeals and other current business.




