

Everest Climbs Mountain to No. 1

ith the biggest serves of her volleyball career in front of her last November, Sarah Bradley did what she always does – took a deep breath and came through for Clarkston Everest Collegiate.

The junior served out the final three points of the Division 4 championship match, including a matchpoint ace to give the Moutaineers a five-set victory and their first Finals title.

"I believe very much in taking a deep breath when I'm serving and zoning everything out," Bradley said.

Bradley's final ace put an exclamation point on an improbable comeback, as Everest trailed 2 sets to none, and 10-3 in the fifth before winning 24-26, 18-25, 25-22, 25-19, 15-13.

It also capped off a historic season for the 10th-ranked Moutaineers, who hadn't won a Regional title prior to the season, let alone compete in Kellogg Arena. They more than made their mark in their first trip, with a pair of 0-2 comebacks, including a Semifinal win over top-ranked Adrian Lenawee Christian.

"I'm blown away by these girls," first-year Everest coach Danielle Walker said. "To come back two days in a row from two sets down. It's just amazing."


It looked early in the fifth set that the rally in sets 3 and 4 may have been for naught. Leland jumped out to a quick 5-1 lead and had stretched it to 10-3 before Everest was able to find its way back in.

The Comets took a 13-11 lead when Kelsey Allen and Abby Hicks teamed up for a block of Bradley. She came back immediately with a kill, however, and then served out the match.

Bradley finished with a match-high 31 kills, tied for sixth all-time in a Finals match. Walker finished with 57 assists, tied for second all-time. The 64 team kills for the Mountaineers (32-4-2) are tied for fourth all-time.

While this weekend served as an introduction to the rest of the state for Everest, it was goodbye from a legend on the other side.

Leland coach Laurie Glass, with more than 1,100 wins and three Finals titles in her 29 years leading the Comets, announced after the match that it was her last.



"I've known all along that I wanted to see this group through and be there with them in this moment," she said. "I'm proud to be from Leland. I'm proud to have coached at Leland. I couldn't have gone out in a better way. I wanted the season to be about them, 100 percent. I didn't want to have big farewells. I wanted them to have their season."

The Comets finished Glass' final season 41-17-2, and did so fielding a team of just seven players, five of whom were seniors.

Fiona Moord led Leland with 17 kills, while Shelby Plamondon and Allen both had 12. Olive Ryder had 10 kills and 21 digs, Hicks had 45 assists and Mallory Lowe had 18 digs.

Madelyn Krappman had 20 kills for Everest, while Addison Pearce added 11. Krappman and Bradley both had 18 digs.

D2: North Branch Closes Out an Era on Top

A decade's worth of team volleyball came to an end last November for eight North Branch seniors. So while the Broncos had just won their second-straight MHSAA Division 2 title, the tinge of sadness to the tears streaming down their faces was understandable.

"All of us started, a majority of us eight seniors started when we were 8 years old," Broncos senior Alana Deshetsky said. "We all played togewther since we were 8, so I think we have a deeper connection than some other teams."

While the 25-18, 25-14, 25-18 win against Grand Rapids West Catholic at Kellogg Arena marked the end of an era, the group left a legacy that will never be forgotten at a program that was already considered one of the state's elite.


For the first time in program history, North Branch won back-to-back titles. That came after a runner-up finish in 2021, giving a class that had been major contributors since they were freshmen three Finals appearances in four years.

And, as freshman, they lost in five sets to the eventual Division 2 champion, Pontiac Notre Dame Prep.

North Branch (56-4-1) spent the entire season ranked No. 1 in Division 2, and Coach Jim Fish scheduled the best competition he could find throughout the state to keep his group sharp.

It worked. North Branch defeated the No. 2 team Grand Rapids Christian in Thursday's Semifinal, but didn't let down at all in the Final..

Aubree Deshetsky led the North Branch attack against West Catholic with 14 kills, while Clara Gyomory had nine. Adrienne Greschaw (right) had 31 assists. The Deshetskys led the defense, as Aubree had 19 digs and Alana had 13. Brooke Tietz had seven kills to lead West Catholic, while Emma Tuttle had six. Alivia Mott had 11 assists, while Amelia Gagnon had 12 digs and Grace Steiner had 10.



"Unbelievable" Finish Lifts Mercy

oretta Vogel had a single word to describe Farmington Hills Mercy's five-set victory in the 2023 MHSAA Division 1 Volleyball Final: Unbelievable.

"When we played Marian, to me, that was everything," the Mercy coach said of her team's Quarterfinal win over the 2022 Division 1 champion. "Then to get in the Finals, to be down two games, such adversity, unbelievable. I don't know if it's going to hit me for six months, what we accomplished. It was unbelievable."

After dropping the first two sets, Mercy came back to defeat Grand Rapids Forest Hills Northern 13-25, 23-25, 25-21, 25-22, 15-12 at Kellogg Arena, adding a second championship to the program's first, won in 2019.

The Marlins finished the season with a 32-15-3 record and entered the postseason outside the top 10 in Division 1. With just two seniors on the roster, three sophomores in the starting lineup and a freshman as one of their leading hitters, one can start to see how Vogel arrived at "unbelievable."

"I think we were a little timid in the first set," said Mercy junior setter Campbell Flynn,. "It was our first time being in the Finals, so we were all a little nervous."

Flynn put on a masterclass in game management, finishing with 41 assists, and so much more than that.

"Campbell Flynn took over the match," Northern coach Valerie Lurye said. "We put a lot of our gameplan to making sure (Flynn) couldn't score, and forcing her to do things like setting other kids. And the other kids showed up."

The biggest beneficiary of Campbell's ball movement was freshman Kate Kalczynski, who finished the match with a game-high 25 kills. Five of those kills came during the fifth set.

"Kate played amazing today," Flynn said. "I literally just had to set her the ball and she got kills. I'm so proud of her. She's only a freshman, but she played a big role. I was just so beyond proud of her."

Cree Hollier added 10 kills for Mercy, while Angie Butler – playing with a torn meniscus suffered in the summer – had seven kills and 22 digs. One of Butler's kills came late in the fourth set and gave her team a 20-18 lead. It was the first bit of distance Mercy was able to create



in a back-and-forth set, which the Marlins went on to win.

Vogel said her team started to play like it had nothing to lose after the first two sets, and that flurry certainly backed up that assertion. The change in attitude and energy didn't go unnoticed on the other side of the net.

"I would say they just really turned up their energy," Northern senior Elana Erickson said. "They really turned it up though in the third, fourth and fifth set."

Erickson finished with 22 kills and 27 digs to lead Northern (45-8-1). Kendall Hopewell added 16 kills, 11 digs and seven total blocks, while Lexie Stotenbur had 41 assists.

Jillian Collins had 24 digs for Mercy, while Flynn added 15.

D3: Kalamazoo Christian Earns First Volleyball Crown

The ball hadn't stopped bouncing before the tears came for Holland DeVries. The Kalamazoo Christian senior's spike caromed off a Traverse City St. Francis block, spinning to the ground to end the 2023 MHSAA Division 3 Volleyball Final at Kellogg Arena.

DeVries (right) immediately turned, emotions taking over, and joined her teammates in a pile on the court.

"I've been on this team for four years, and we've worked so hard – I've been playing since 6th grade with six of these seniors," DeVries said.

DeVries and the Comets defeated St. Francis 26-24, 16-25, 25-23, 25-20 to claim the first volleyball title in school history. It came a year after they were runners-up, losing in four sets against Pewamo-Westphalia.

The Comets slayed that dragon, downing the Pirates in a Quarterfinal, but they weren't satisfied until coach Carlie Southland was handed the Finals championship trophy.

"Especially for our seniors, we had six of them this year, and this was their last shot," Southland said. "We made it a goal to win the Finals, so it feels extra good to have done that."


Kalamazoo Christian didn't take a lead in the first set until 25-24, as it fell behind 13-3. After chipping away and spending most of the set down a single point, a kill from DeVries and an emphatic block by Hayden Deming gave the Comets the 26-24 victory in the set, which featured seven kills from Makenna Ekkens.

While St. Francis won the second set going away, the third and fourth were back and forth throughout, but it was the Comets who found a way to come out ahead in each.

DeVries finished with 16 kills and 27 digs for the Comets (43-6-3), while Ekkens had 17 kills and 14 digs. They were two of the six seniors, joined by classmates Mackenzie Ash, Lola Stecker, Jovie Cochran and Sophia Nash.





Sportsmanship Extends to Online Behavior

ith the changes that have occurred in college sports the past couple of years, high school sports is truly the last level of pure amateur competition in our country - and the NFHS and its member state associations want it to remain that way.

As football, volleyball, soccer, cross country and other sports begin this fall, high school coaches and athletic/activity directors will be involved in preseason meetings to emphasize the expected outcomes of education-based sports, as well as speech, debate, music, theatre and other programs.

Among those fundamental values of education-based activities that must be discussed is sportsmanship, or good sporting behavior. More than winning, more than learning the skills of a sport, a focus on sportsmanship has been one of the defining elements of high school sports and other activities for more than 100 years.

Along with maintaining the sound traditions of sports and minimizing the risk of injury, NFHS playing rules encourage sportsmanship, and the first page in all NFHS rules publications includes a statement noting that "each athlete is responsible for exercising caution and good sportsmanship."

In the past, with an emphasis on conduct on the playing field or court - or in the auditorium or rehearsal hall - sportsmanship has been defined as those qualities of behavior that are characterized by generosity and genuine concern for others. More so than preparing students to play sports or another activity at the next level, one of the significant goals of education-based high school sports and activities is helping the 12 million-plus individuals in these programs to become responsible citizens.

And in today's online world dominated by hand-held devices, that goal has become more challenging. Now, messages to students in high school sports and other activities about sportsmanship must be communicated before they hit the practice field or court because one inappropriate post, tweet or message could alter their lives forever.

At the recent virtual National Student Leadership Summit hosted by the NFHS, Christina Jontra of Neptune Navigate, one of the newest NFHS corporate partners, discussed the need for good sportsmanship online as much or more so than on the court or field.

In the digital age in which we live, participants in high school activity programs need to be aware that their character and respect for others should be the same, whether in the sport or activity itself, or online.

As the popularity and influence of social media continues to surge, it is imperative that student-athletes, as well as coaches, administrators, parents and everyone involved in educationbased athletics, are aware of the ways they can endanger themselves with their online behavior and understand the techniques they can employ to prevent that from happening.

In her recent presentation, Jontra noted five characteristics of good sportsmanship online honesty, compassion, respect, responsibility and courage. Just as a student would respect an opponent on the field or in the debate room, the same must occur online.

At preseason meetings this fall, coaches and athletic/activity directors should encourage students in their programs to be mindful of online contact with individuals on opposing teams - particularly any bantering that could be perceived as cyberbullying. As Jontra mentioned in her message during the NSLS, hurtful words can ruin a person's life forever.

Fortunately, during the season, the millions of high school students involved in sports and performing arts have less free time to spend online on a daily basis, but the time spent must be done in a positive manner. Not only could damaging words on social media affect a student's chances for an athletic scholarship, inappropriate messages could also negatively impact future job possibilities as employers are more actively auditing social media.

Whether the setting is before hundreds of people at an actual game or event, or a private experience alone online, positive and respectful behavior should be the choice every time.

Scholar-Athlete Award in 36th Year Awarding Scholarships to Students

housands of students voluntarily extend their classroom day by taking part in extracurricular activities, often improving their academic achievements in the process. The value that such programs play in the total education of a high school student is highlighted through the MHSAA/Farm Bureau Insurance Scholar-Athlete Award, which will award \$2,000 scholarships to 32 top student-athletes and recognize over 2,000 other outstanding individuals in 2024-25.

Students applying for the Scholar-Athlete Award must be graduating during the 2024-25 school year, carry a 3.5 grade-point average, and have previously won a letter in a varsity sport that the MHSAA sponsors postseason competition.

Applicants will also be required to show involvement in other school/community activities and submit an essay on the importance of sportsmanship in educational athletics.

Each MHSAA member school is allowed to nominate a number of student-athletes based on the size of the school. Class A schools can nominate six boys and six girls, Class B four boys and four girls, Class C three boys and three girls and Class D two boys and two girls. The first 30 scholarships will be awarded based on this graduated scale, with two additional scholarships intended



for minority applicants.

A committee composed of school administrators from across the state will select regional and statewide winners

Student Advisory Council Aids MHSAA

ight student-athletes who will be juniors at their schools during the 2024-25 academic year have been selected to serve two-year terms on the Michigan High School Athletic Association's Student Advisory Council.

The Student Advisory Council is a 16-member group which provides feedback on issues impacting educational athletics from a student's perspective, and also is involved in the operation of MHSAA championship events and other programming. Members of the Student Advisory Council serve for two years, beginning as juniors. Eight new members are selected annually to serve on the SAC, with nominations made by MHSAA member schools. The incoming juniors will join the group of eight seniors-to-be appointed a year ago.

Selected to begin serving on the Student Advisory Council in 2024-25 are: Itzel Albarran, Bronson; Harper Barnhart, Brownstown Woodhaven; Diamond Cook, Southfield Christian; Henry Ewles, Pontiac Notre Dame Prep; Cole Haist, Big Rapids; Frannie Keeley, Jenison; Trey LaValley, Romeo; and Ethan Stine, Bridgman.

Those eight new members were selected from 90 applicants. The first Student Advisory Council was formed for the 2006-07 school year. With the addition of this class beginning this summer, members will have represented 142 schools from 51 leagues plus independent schools that do not play in a league. Combined, the new appointees have participated in 10 MHSAA sports, and five will be the first SAC members from their respective schools.

The Student Advisory Council generally meets seven times each school year, and once more for a 24-hour leadership camp. In addition to assisting in the promotion of the educational value of interscholastic athletics, the Council discusses issues dealing with the 4 S's of educational athletics: scholarship, sportsmanship, safety (including health and nutrition) and the sensible scope of athletic programs. There also is a fifth S discussed by the group – student leadership.

This school year, the Council handed out championship trophies at Finals events, led sessions during four Sportsmanship Summits and provided assistance at the

MHSAA Representative Council

he Representative Council of the Michigan High School Athletic Association is the body assembled to carry out the wishes of member schools. The Council meets several times annually to discuss and pass legislation concerning interscholastic athletics in Michigan.

The Representative Council is made up of 19 members, with all but five elected by a vote of MHSAA-member schools to represent different geographic regions, different sizes of schools, non-public schools, and junior and middle schools. Two members are elected to statewide at-large positions. Four members are appointed by the Council to facilitate representation of females and minorities, and the 19th position is occupied by the Superintendent of Public Instruction or his/her designee.

The officers and two other representatives form the MHSAA's Executive Committee, which meets on a monthly basis during the school year to review eligibility appeals and other current business.





Michigan high school seniors and students who recently graduated from high school may be eligible for the Michigan Achievement Scholarship.

Community College Guarantee

All students are eligible for the Community College Guarantee (regardless of family income), which includes:

- Earning a skills certificate or associate degree tuition-free at their indistrict community college!*
- An additional \$1,000 Michigan Achievement Bonus for Pell-eligible students to use toward additional college costs.

Public or Private University

Students may be eligible to receive the Michigan Achievement Scholarship at a Public or Private University.

- Up to \$27,500 to earn a bachelor's degree—that's \$5,500 per year for up to five years.
- 7 in 10 high school graduates are eligible.

Career Training

Students may be eligible to receive the Michigan Achievement Scholarship at a career training program.
